Winners of the 2018 VSA Playwright Discovery Competition Recognizing Excellence in Young Playwrights

Three Young Playwrights from Kentucky, Michigan, and Texas
Invited to Participate in Weekend of Pre-Professional Activities at the
Kennedy Center, April 13–15, 2018

(WASHINGTON)—Three young playwrights from Kentucky, Michigan, and Texas have been selected as the winners of the 2018 VSA Playwright Discovery Competition, a Jean Kennedy Smith Arts and Disability program of the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts. The competition challenges middle to high-schooled aged writers to explore the disability experience through crafting short plays— from their own experiences and observations, creating fictional characters and settings, or choosing to write metaphorically or abstractly about the disability experience. The three winning playwrights of the competition's Senior Division (grades 10–12) will travel to Washington, D.C. to participate in a weekend of pre-professional activities at the Kennedy Center during the annual Kennedy Center American College Theater Festival, April 13–15.

The young playwrights will engage with seasoned professional playwrights, directors, and actors to refine their scripts and further develop their playwriting skills. Excerpts from selected scripts will be presented as part of the weekend's activities.

A group of theater professionals will spend the weekend coaching, mentoring, and working with the young playwrights. Mentors include Woolly Mammoth Theatre Company Member and multiple Helen Hayes Award nominee Jon Hudson Odom; Curt L. Tofteland, founder of Shakespeare Behind Bars; Kennedy Center Kenan Fellow in Directing Robyn Rikoon; disability advocate and actress Christine Bruno from Alliance for Inclusion in the Arts; and Gary Garrison, the Director of the Dramatists Guild Institute. A dynamic acting company including Kashayna Johnson, Chelsea Dee, Justin Weaks, Joey Ibanez, Barb Pinolini, Christine Bruno, CarrieAnn Quinn, and Clayton Pelham, Jr. will also work with the playwrights on their plays.

"The stories on the page and the talent of these five high school students with disabilities grabbed us at the first reading." said Betty Siegel, Director of VSA and Accessibility at the Kennedy Center. "Their writing, their singular voices, and their capacity to engage us in their stories through the art of playwriting comes from many places ranging from personal courage to self-expression and ingenuity! We are honored to support their continued creative development."

2018 VSA Playwright Discovery Competition Winners

Cathleen Freedman (*One's Self Perception*) is a senior within the creative writing department at the High School for the Performing and Visual Arts in Houston, Texas. Her writing has been performed by her peers in Houston, herself, and actors in New York City. Freedman was born with radial dysplasia in her dominant right hand, which later resulted in arthritis during her freshman year. She has since had two surgeries, multiple casts and splints, and become left-handed. As she likes to say, she went through high school "single-handedly." She is thrilled and honored to be a 2018 VSA Discovery Playwright!

Taryn Seif (*I'll Do Anything*) is a junior at the Kentucky School for the Blind. Seif, who has low vision, is motivated to write a good story. Besides continuing to write plays

and stories, in the future, she would like to learn how to teach assistive technology to those who need it.

Elizabeth Schriner (*Confessing a Chronic Illness*) is a high school senior in Olivet, Michigan. Three years ago, she was diagnosed with Systemic Lupus Erythematosus (Lupus/SLE) and Lupus Nephritis. She has been involved in various local drama productions, including her recent performance of "JoJo" in her high school's production of *Seussical*. She has also received numerous Michigan Interscholastic Forensic Association (MIFA) Excellence and Superior Honor Awards for acting, dramaturgy, program design, and lobby display design at the district, regional, and state level. She is extremely thankful for this amazing opportunity.
